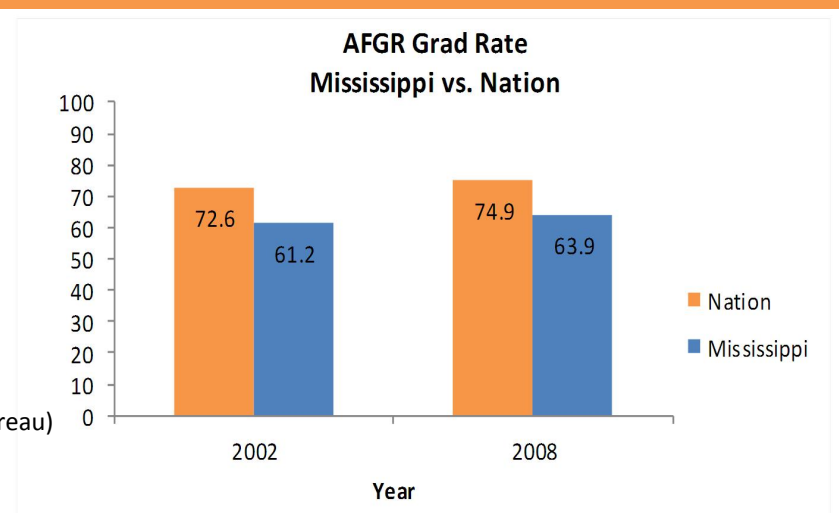
<b>I</b>	Average Freshman Graduation Rate (AFGR): Increased from <b>61.2</b> to <b>63.9</b> percent from 2002 to 2008 Average of <b>0.4</b> points per year	Needs to increase <b>2.2</b> points per year starting in 2008 to reach 90 percent by 2020
<b>II</b>	Class of 2008 had <b>1,048</b> more graduates than Class of 2002*	Class of 2020 needs <b>10,130</b> more graduates than Class of 2008* to reach 90 percent
<b>III</b>	<b>20</b> fewer dropout factories in 2009 than 2002	In 2009, there were <b>42</b> dropout factories. To reach 0 by 2016, <b>6</b> schools need to improve per year.
<b>IV</b>	<b>11,231</b> fewer students attended dropout factories in 2009 than 2002	<b>32,588</b> students still attend dropout factories in 2009
<b>V</b>	Percent of 4th graders testing at or above proficient in Reading (NAEP) increased from <b>18</b> percent to <b>22</b> percent, from 2003 to 2009	<b>29,764</b> 4th graders still not proficient in Reading
<b>VI</b>	Percent of 8th graders testing at or above proficient in Math (NAEP) increased from <b>12</b> percent to <b>15</b> percent, from 2003 to 2009	<b>29,553</b> 8th graders still not proficient in Math
<b>VII</b>	Students who took at least one AP exam during high school increased <b>7.3</b> percentage points from <b>6.8</b> percent to <b>14.1</b> percent, from 2001 to 2010	Only <b>31.2</b> percent of test-takers scored at least one "3" or higher

#### CONTEXT

**Poverty:** Mississippi ranks **1st** in childhood poverty at **31.9** percent.

**College Education:** Mississippi ranks **47th** in college completion at **21.5** percent.

#### DEFINITIONS AND SOURCES

- I** Averaged Freshman Graduation Rate (AFGR): Provides an estimate of the overall graduation rate by averaging 8th, 9th, and 10th grade enrollments for each cohort, then dividing into the number of diplomas awarded. In 2011-2012 all reporting will shift to the US Department of Education rate using longitudinal databases.
- II** Numbers are calculated according to the definition and data provided by the US Department of Education.  
\*Holding the population constant: In 2008, if the graduation rate was the same as it had been in 2002, this is the difference in number of graduates.
- III, IV** Numbers are calculated based on enrollment data from the Common Core of Data (CCD) at the US Department of Education.  
Dropout Factory: A school with 60 percent or fewer seniors than freshmen enrolled three years earlier. (Regular or Vocational enrollment high school with 300 or more students enrolled.)
- V, VI** Scores were gathered from state profiles on the NAEP website.
- VII** Numbers are from "The 7th Annual AP® Report to the Nation" from the College Board website.
