
## **CONTEXT**

I	Average Freshman Graduation Rate (AFGR): Increased from <b>71.0</b> to <b>76.5</b> percent from 2002 to 2009 Average of <b>0.8</b> points per year	Needs to increase <b>1.2</b> points per year starting in 2009 to reach 90 percent by 2020
II	Class of 2009 had <b>2,527</b> more graduates than Class of 2002*	Class of 2020 needs <b>6,202</b> more graduates than Class of 2009* to reach 90 percent

## **ECONOMIC BENEFITS**

With a 90 percent graduation rate, the additional graduates could deliver an estimated \$51 million in increased annual earnings, \$12 million in increased annual state tax revenues, and an increase in the Gross State Product of \$61 million.
