

## **CHALLENGES**

II	Class of 2010 had <b>1,489</b> more graduates than Class of 2002	Class of 2020 needs <b>823</b> more graduates than Class of 2010 to reach 90 percent
III	<b>1</b> fewer dropout factory in 2011 than 2002	In 2011, there were <b>3</b> dropout factories. To reach 0 by 2016, <b>1</b> school needs to improve per year.
IV	<b>3,317</b> fewer students attended dropout factories in 2011 than 2002	<b>2,488</b> students still attend dropout factories in 2011

This state has reported the new, four-year adjusted cohort graduation rate (ACGR) that is now required by the U.S. Department of Education (USDOE). The ACGR for 2011 is **88.0** percent.

All but 3 states report the new rate. Idaho and Kentucky were issued waivers from the USDOE allowing them until 2013/2014 to report the new rate. Oklahoma has applied for a waiver and is awaiting approval.

## **ECONOMIC BENEFITS**

With a 90 percent graduation rate, the additional graduates could deliver an estimated **\$12 million** in increased annual earnings, **\$2 million** in increased annual state and local tax revenues, and an increase in the Gross State Product of **\$14 million**.
