
**Poverty:** Pennsylvania ranks **37th** in childhood poverty at **17.5** percent.

I	Average Freshman Graduation Rate (AFGR): Increased from <b>80.2</b> to <b>84.1</b> percent from 2002 to 2010 Average of <b>0.5</b> points per year	Needs to increase <b>0.6</b> points per year starting in 2010 to reach 90 percent by 2020
II	Class of 2010 had <b>6,085</b> more graduates than Class of 2002	Class of 2020 needs <b>9,205</b> more graduates than Class of 2010 to reach 90 percent
Ш	<b>5</b> fewer dropout factories in 2011 than 2002	In 2011, there were <b>43</b> dropout factories. To reach 0 by 2016, <b>9</b> schools need to improve per year.
IV	<b>24,260</b> fewer students attended dropout factories in 2011 than 2002	<b>43,517</b> students still attend dropout factories in 2011

VIII	This state has reported the new, four-year adjusted cohort graduation rate (ACGR) that is now required by the U.S. Department of Education (USDOE). The ACGR for 2011 is 83.0 percent.	All but 3 states report the new rate. Idaho and Kentucky were issued waivers from the USDOE allowing them until 2013/2014 to report the new rate. Oklahoma has applied for a waiver and is awaiting approval.

#### **ECONOMIC BENEFITS**

With a 90 percent graduation rate, the additional graduates could deliver an estimated \$123 million in increased annual earnings, \$14 million in increased annual state and local tax revenues, and an increase in the Gross State Product of \$152 million.
