#### **CONTEXT**


Poverty: 49 states have lower childhood poverty rates than Kentucky, at 31.8 percent.

College Education: Kentucky has a higher proportion of college completion than 5 states at **20.7** percent.

**PROGRESS** CHALLENGES

I	Adjusted Cohort Graduation Rate (ACGR): Kentucky first reported ACGR in 2013, of <b>86.1</b> percent.	The ACGR for Kentucky needs to increase <b>0.56</b> points per year starting in 2013-2014 to reach 90 percent by 2020.
п	The Class of 2012-2013 had <b>41,351</b> graduates.	The Class of 2020 needs <b>1,873</b> more graduates than the Class of 2012-2013 to reach 90 percent in this state.
III	27 fewer dropout factories in 2013 than 2002.	In 2013, there were <b>12</b> dropout factories in Kentucky. To reach 0 by 2020, <b>2</b> schools need to improve per year.*  *If the state has 7 or fewer dropout factories, 1 is assigned for 2013-2014.
IV	<b>24,666</b> fewer students attended dropout factories in 2013 than in 2002.	<b>10,535</b> students still attend dropout factories in 2013.
V	85.4 percent of low-income* students graduated high school on time in 2013.  *In this context, low-income is defined as the percentage of students eligible for free- or reduced-price lunch.	<b>86.8</b> percent of medium and high income students graduated high school on time in 2013, leaving an "opportunity" gap of <b>1.4</b> percentage points.
VI	Percent of 4th-graders testing at or above proficient in reading (NAEP) increased from <b>31</b> percent to <b>36</b> percent, from 2003 to 2013.	<b>31,901</b> 4th-graders still not proficient in reading.
VII	Percent of 8th-graders testing at or above proficient in math (NAEP) increased from <b>24</b> percent to <b>30</b> percent, from 2003 to 2013.	<b>35,030</b> 8th-graders still not proficient in math.
VIII	The number of students who took at least one AP exam during high school increased <b>18</b> percentage points, from <b>13.6</b> percent to <b>31.6</b> percent, from 2003 to 2013.	Only <b>5.3</b> percent of test-takers scored at least one "3" or higher.
